# **PURPOSE:**

To recognize Dr. Michael J. Martirano, Superintendent, St. Mary's County Public Schools, on his selection as Maryland's Superintendent of the Year for 2009.

## BACKGROUND:

Each year the Public School Superintendents Association of Maryland (PSSAM) selects a local superintendent of schools as Maryland Superintendent of the Year. This individual is selected on the basis of his/her leadership for learning, communication skills, professionalism, and community involvement. Once selected, Maryland's Superintendent of the Year is entered into competition to be named National Superintendent of the Year. Dr. Martirano's resume is attached.

Since being named superintendent of St. Mary's County Public Schools in July 2005, Dr. Martirano has reorganized the school system with an emphasis on service to schools. He takes every opportunity to fully engage in school-based discussions on what works best for students, and is guided by one focus -- creating a total community committed to learning and safety for all children in St. Mary's County. Dr. Martirano has established a vision plan entitled "Charting a Course to Excellence" that highlights 15 priorities to improve student achievement. His vision has also led to the implementation of Educational Pathways, including the establishment of STEM Academies at all three levels that provide a rigorous curriculum focused on mathematics and science with an infusion of technology and engineering; an Academy of Finance; and alternative pathways to high school success, including the Tech Connect program and the Fairlead Academy which is a 9th grade school geared toward preventing high school dropouts. Additionally, programs have been added to the Dr. James A. Forrest Career and Technology Center to meet the needs of all students. "When Dr. Martirano became superintendent, he recognized the needs of the school system and welcomed the challenge to take a good school system and make it a great school system," wrote Mr. William Mattingly, chairman of the Board of Education of St. Mary's County, in his letter nominating Dr. Martirano for this award. # DR. MARTIRANO NAMED MARYLAND'S SUPERINTENDENT OF THE YEAR

LEONARDTOWN, MD – Dr. Michael J. Martirano, superintendent of schools, was named Maryland's Superintendent of the Year by the Public School Superintendents Association of Maryland (PSSAM) at the PSSAM conference retreat dinner held October 23, 2008, in Ocean City, MD. The Superintendent of the Year Award is presented annually at the conference to recognize a chief administrator who exemplifies excellence and achievement in educational leadership.

"Under Dr. Martirano's leadership, the St. Mary's County Public School System has made significant progress in ensuring that all students have access to a rigorous educational program," said Dr. Carl Roberts, executive director of PSSAM. "He is accomplishing this through a collaborative, yet aggressive leadership style that will not yield to distractions that delay achievement of the school system's mission."

During a recent visit to St. Mary's County, Dr. Nancy S. Grasmick, state superintendent of schools, credited Dr. Martirano for the school systems "truly stunning" initiatives and continued progress. "It was evident in all of the information shared that critical decision-making and strategic planning is taking place at every important moment in the St. Mary's County Public School System," she concluded.

In 2007, Dr. Martirano was selected as the Superintendent of the Year by the American Cancer Society Maryland Region. In addition, he was named a 2006-2007 Outstanding Leader by the University of Maryland 's College of Education . In 2006, he was named the Educational Administrator of the Year by the Maryland Association of Educational Office Professionals (MAEOP).

"Dr. Martirano's leadership skills, his enthusiastic nature, and his welcoming personality have brought out the best in St. Mary's County Public Schools," said Mrs. Cathy Allen, vice chairman of the Board of Education of St. Mary's County. "His leadership and knowledge have combined to ensure that students and staff have every opportunity to be successful. He is an asset to our community and being recognized as Maryland Superintendent of the Year is a well deserved honor."

Dr. Martirano will now go on to compete against other state superintendents throughout the United States for the 2009 National Superintendent of the Year award sponsored by the American Association of School Administrators (AASA). AASA will announce the winner in February 2009, at its National Conference on Education in San Francisco, CA.

"Dr. Martirano is an outstanding selection for Maryland's Superintendent of the Year award and is an excellent candidate for National Superintendent of the Year consideration," said Dr. Roberts.
