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#### **SEED Maryland History**



- Landmark legislation: Martin O'Malley, Nancy Grasmick and other state leaders worked with SEED to create legislation forming the nation's first state-wide, public, college-preparatory boarding school for at-risk youth.
- Innovation for families: SEED Maryland's boarding school serves 380 students in grades 6-10 from 17 counties.
- Public/private partnership: SEED Maryland has attracted over \$58mm in private funds.
- Fiscal responsibility: SEED has had a balanced budget, clean audit and approved state reporting every year.
- Construction: Built 2 dorms and Phase
   1 academic site on time/under budget.
- Governance: State-wide board trustees include Jack Laporte, Craig Thompson, John Claster, Senator Paula Hollinger. SEED Foundation board includes Dr. Nancy Grasmick.

#### Glimpse into SEED Maryland



#### SEED Students

- Nearly 3/4 FARMS, 77% single parent, 25% have a caseworker
- 18 students qualified for Johns Hopkins CTY program
- All 9<sup>th</sup> grade students took their first AP exam

#### SEED Program

- 11 college visits plus 9<sup>th</sup> grade trip to NACAC College Fair
- Over 50% of students receive regular counseling
- > 20,000 student hours of independent silent reading
- > 50,000 student hours of intervention/enrichment
- 12 sports including wrestling, lacrosse and volleyball


#### SEED Institution

- 5 of the 8 leadership team members live on campus
- Selected as a State School of Character
- 16 staff members recognized for 4 years of service on Founder's Day
- Partnerships with Loyola, Johns Hopkins, St. Agnes, Mobile Dentist

#### Average Annual Student Retention Years 1 thru 4




National average for student retention is 80-85% (annual student mobility is 15%-20%) (US Census, 2004)

Note that this represents the start up years of SEED DC. The average student retention rate at SEED DC for the past 4 year is 88%.




# Percent Prof or Adv in Math Cohort Growth from 2011 to 2012






#### 2011 and 2012 MSA SEED & State Average for Grades 6-8






# 2012 MSA - All Students Percent Proficient or Advanced






# 2012 MSA Math – Title I, African-American Students Percent Proficient or Advanced



#### Retention: 2011 - 2012




# Student Retention 2011-2012



#### Retention: Dismissals vs. Withdrawn




#### **Student Withdrawals and Dismissals**

#### **SEED DC Number of Graduates**




Based on historical trends, we expect to have 40-44 SEED Maryland students graduating in 2015.
